Message from the President

Hello SWG wood processors,

Many of you remember back to the 'good-ole-days' before there were pagers, cell-phones, or computers. Hard to believe that we managed to survive without those communication devices. Before the World Wide Web existed, the early SWG Steering gang hammered out a mission statement. In summary, it states we are a regional association encouraging woodworkers of various skills, knowledge, and interest. Our method is to offer fellowship by providing networking opportunities for technical development. We also wish to promote an appreciation of quality workmanship. Consider for a minute what the SWG is NOT: a gallery, a school, an apprenticeship program, a community shop, a library of woodworking books, or a website trying to sell things.

As a volunteer organization it has been important to keep things simple and avoid getting over-extended. Now let's return to the 1980's when a few books and the first generation of Fine Woodworking magazines started getting information out about the many skills and tools needed to create beautiful and diverse wooden products often with very specific and unique materials and methods. Think about boat builders, instrument makers, carvers, mansion builders, and so on.

Before there was much written about these crafts, the only way to learn was to be there working directly beside an experienced wood cutter. Although I valued the knowledge shared on the page, it was usually by working along with others that I got useful tips and tricks-of-the-trade. For awhile the SWG had a small box full of videos covering different topics and offered them to Insight students to borrow as part of the class package. Those could be helpful if they were on the exact same topic you were

curious about. Now with our YouTube generation that has 24 hour available information about 'everything', many people rely on their screens to get educated. Very convenient, often answering a question, but NOT very personal. It can not correct your mis-steps or pat you on the back.

When I went to Mendocino in the summer of 1980 for a month of training under the guidance of James Krenov I found his shared wisdom very beneficial. However, it was my connection with the other students and the accomplishments of the Mendocino Woodworkers Association that stood out as being vital to my experience. Their direct involvement in helping to problem solve our way through various topics created a shared support system during that time. This camaraderie, upon returning to southern Oregon, was the impetus that had me talking to others about forming our own organization. Thus the Siskiyou Woodcraft Guild was born and we held our first show on Thanksgiving Weekend 1980 in the OSF Great Hall.

It took a few years before we ironed out our mission language, but the basics were established: through continued networking we can encourage quality workmanship and thereby promote our craft to potential clients. Having peers to turn to for assistance and advice has continued to be beneficial for many SWG members. Our Insight students have often joined the SWG and possibly found other students with whom they develop a wood friendly and long term relationship. Our Shop-Chats get folks together, face-to-face, to ask questions and become more familiar with our wide range of talented, skilled, and experienced

Over these many years of being called the president of the SWG I have learned to wear many hats - that
