




SHOP CHATS

Message from the President

Hello Splinter Cushions,

What a wonderful thing to have presented a successful 41st Thanksgiving Weekend 'live' Show. Overcoming some 'stumbling blocks' to settle on our location in OSF's Carpenter Hall was challenging. Finding out how many of our regular participants who were unable or unwilling to be involved was also notan-easy task. The SWG officers all put in an extra effort in the final month to get the word out, prepare the brochure, update our signage, as well as build and paint 3 sandwich signboard stands. Fortunately, our small participant number allowed us to fit snugly into the smaller building. The quality, creativity, and variety we are known for was on full display.

The show, however, is not the focus of this letter - which could be titled 'The Tale of Two Johns.' I am referring to John Jory and John Webb. Both have given tremendous efforts in volunteering with our Insight into Woodworking classes. J. W. has been our onsight class coordinator for many years - bringing the locator signs, name tags, evaluation forms, and assistance to all our teachers. His quiet and thoughtful demeanor has underplayed his value to the students. His commitment to helping present these classes has only ended now that his wife retired and they can finally go RV-ing around the country. So unless Mr. J. W. is camping nearby he won't be able to continue helping us and is probably out looking for the next national park or fishing spot. Fortunately for us David Stan (our class scheduler and registration coordinator) has a pal who is eager to take on J. W.'s position and tasks. His name is Richard LeVee. Let us welcome him to our class crew!

John Jory is well known for teaching the first class in our series. If

you have seen his reproduction furniture pieces, carvings, or exquisite boxes, then you are aware of his uncompromising desire to get-it-right. As a retired engineer, he brought a studied approach to each undertaking with a willingness to ask questions and hunt down a useful answer. His opening class might have been called "What It Takes To Start Woodworking" - covering space, lighting, and many tools. His class handout has grown into a treatise that he updated yearly. He offered his continued assistance to all the students and was available for problem solving to SWG members as well. Unfortunately, he is now struggling with an aggressive cancer and is having weekly chemotherapy. He has been working with Eric Olson to liquidate the shop that he can no longer use.

When I was contacting past show participants to determine their availability I became depressed when I heard some of the responses. Mark Zumwalt is recovering from a heart attack. Don DeDobbeleer is struggling with arthritis, especially in his hands. I was facing the fact that many SWGers are elderly and are dealing with health issues that is unfortunately becoming a regular concern. The topic of how to 'grow' new/ younger woodworkers is complicated by limited educational opportunities and uncertain financial stability. There are tons of questions about that and not a lot of answers. It is sad to see talented people lose their abilities.

I'm sorry that this letter hasn't been full of useful shop-tips like: sharpen your pencil once-a-day, sharpen your chisel once-a-week, and sharpen your wit once-a-month. Instead, I am praising a couple of guys whose volunteering efforts went well beyond the basics. How many miles did John Webb travel to be at


