Message from the President

Hello Wood-carriers,

So much of our time is centered on moving wood from place to place! We prefer to have a truck, lumber rack, or a van to collect our logs, slabs, and boards from a 'yard'. Loading and unloading these piles is not always easy. It can be hard to find a storage location that's dry, level, and out-of-the-way yet available when we want to dig through it. You probably had to move a bunch of 'stuff' to make room for this new delivery. When looking for the right boards to use all these 'sticks' will get handled again, up & in or out, restacked, shuffled around, and brought closer to your tools.

Next is all the handling you do at each work spot to bring that material closer and closer to the right dimension, shape, and fit. After all that marking and processing is completed it is often time to sandsand-sand (and then the 320). Once done smoothing every inch it's time to brag about how many coats of finish you applied to get such a lovely and protective finish. If it was already assembled you can be proud of how many (or few) clamps you used which required getting the material out, setting up for a dry clamp, then actually using before returning them to their resting spot. More carrying!

It would be important to mention that moving isn't only 'grunt work' as there are so many things you might bump into along the way: doorways, tools, and other parts of the project. Don't forget that as each piece gets closer to 'done' that it becomes more and more delicate and you must proceed with great caution so you don't cause a 'problem' to repair. Hey, so I lost count a while back. It has got to be dozens of times you lifted each part from rough start to a polished finish!

Where ever I look in my shop there is usually something that needs to be moved before I can get work done on the current project. Tools to pull out or put away and parts to relocate for their next step. Maybe we should be called the Siskiyou Wood-movers Guild.

On another topic, maybe you noticed that we were searching for a SWG member to volunteer for the On-Site Class Coordinator position. We did finally get a reply from a member who seems like a good fit! Chuck Root is his name and he has been with the guild for many years. As I recall, he also took the insight classes. We are thrilled to have his assistance and look forward to working with him to present the 2025 series.
